Mandates for Equity and Environmental Justice

 EO 13985 (2021) - Advancing Racial Equity and Support for Underserved Communities Through the Federal Government


- EO 14008 (2021) Tackling the Climate Crisis at Home and Abroad
- EO 12898 (1994) Federal Actions to Address Environmental Justice in Minority Populations and Low-Income Populations

Also: MSA, ESA, MMPA, CERCLA, and the Oil Pollution Act



Key Terms: Equity

Equity means the consistent and systematic fair, just, and impartial treatment of all individuals, including individuals who belong to underserved communities that have been denied such treatment.





Key Terms: Environmental Justice

Environmental Justice is the **fair treatment and meaningful involvement of all people**, regardless of race, color, gender, national origin, or income, with respect to the development, implementation, and enforcement of environmental laws, regulations, and policies, including but not limited to:

- Equitable protection from environmental and health hazards
- Equitable access to decision-making processes
- Equitable opportunity for disadvantaged communities that have been historically marginalized



Key Terms: Underserved Communities

Underserved communities have been systematically denied a full opportunity to participate in aspects of economic, social, and civic life.

- Geographic communities
- Populations sharing a particular characteristic such as:
 - women and girls;
 - Black, Latino, and Indigenous and Native American persons, Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders, and other persons of color;
 - persons facing discrimination or barriers related to gender identity; members of religious minorities;
 - lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, and queer (LGBTQ+) persons;
 - persons with disabilities;
 - persons who live in rural areas; and
 - persons otherwise adversely affected by persistent poverty or inequality.

Barriers to Equity and Environmental Justice

- Unawareness of underserved communities
- Structural barriers
- Barriers to accessing services
- System complexity
- Gaps in expertise
- Gaps in representation



Examples from Greater Atlantic Region


- Recreational Fisheries Outreach
 - Translation of several recreational and safe boating guides into Spanish
- Increase Diversity in Hiring, Recruitment and Retention
 - Building relationships with stakeholders at Minority Serving Institutions, STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, and Mathematics) programs, and affinity organizations



The NOAA Fisheries' draft EEJ Strategy asks:

- Who are our underserved communities?
- How can we better communicate with them? How can we better serve them?
- How can we improve equity in our research and monitoring programs?
- Does everyone have equal access to benefits?
- Do some communities carry the weight of regulatory burdens more than others?
- How can our governance or management resources be more inclusive?
